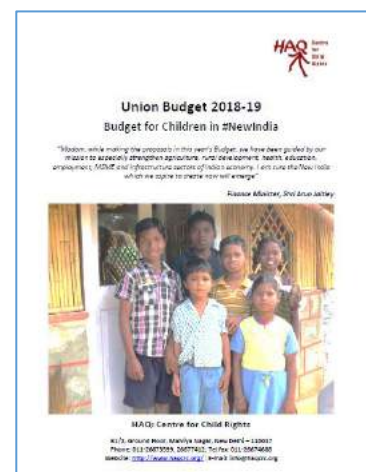
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HAQ: Centre for Child Rights, with the Annual Report for the year 2017-18, entered into 18th year of its journey of upholding and mainstreaming the rights of children. During all these years, HAQ has been constantly pushing and placing the rights of children in each and every social as well as political spaces through innovative and range of issues related to economic, social and cultural rights. At the same time, HAQ continues to focus on linking issues of child rights at micro level to macro level and creating the new knowledge for the public at large. HAQ works through its two main programmes - Children and Governance and Child Protection. Its interventions on children’s access to justice straddle both these programmes and follow a multi-disciplinary approach. HAQ, in the year 2017-18, intensified its engagement with child victims of sexual abuse through providing legal aid and restorative care services. However, HAQ’s intervention in remote areas of West Bengal and Rajasthan through project on child marriage is just another example of working with communities and strengthening the existing systems.

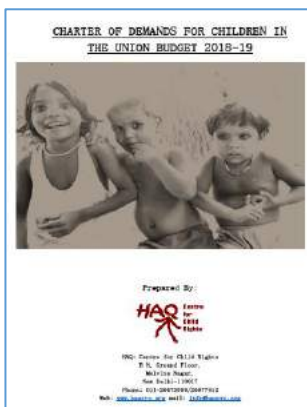
CHILDREN AND GOVERNANCE

Budget for Children (BfC) at National Level

As always, HAQ undertook a quick analysis of Union Budget 2018-19 that was presented on 1st February 2017. The report was titled as “*Union Budget 2018-19: Budget for Children in #NewIndia*”. This time, the analysis focused on the whole issue of Youth and New India and in this context, how children are being left behind with almost no significant changes in the allocation. In 2018-19, which could possibly be the last full-fledged budget of the government before it goes to election, it has fallen to 3.24 per cent. This despite the government adopting the National Plan of Action for Children in the year 2016 with specific goals and strategies to meet its commitment to India’s children. In addition to the analysis that was brought out and shared, a press release was also sent out based on the report.



Charter of Demands (Policy Asks) for Children in Union Budget

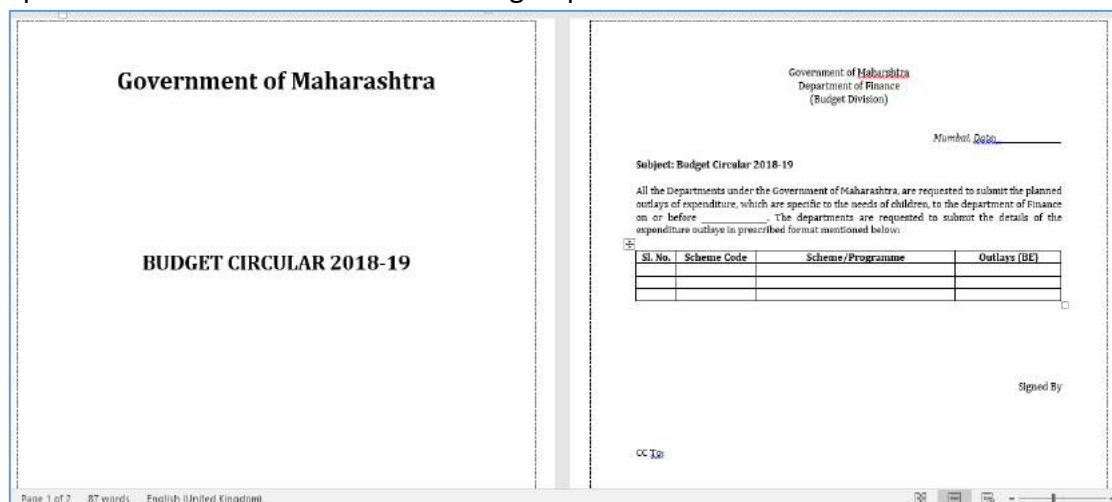


HAQ is an active member of the People’s Budget Initiative (PBI), a network of civil society organisations working on the issue of budget transparency and budget advocacy. HAQ has been an active contributor to this network on the issues of children. Like every year, HAQ was requested to contribute towards the collective process of developing policy-asks from the Union Budget. This process will enable CSOs to underline the need to take action around critical social sectors and vulnerable sections of population by drawing the attention of the Ministry of Finance and other

relevant Line Ministries. HAQ submitted the Charter of Demands for Children in Union Budget 2018-19, which was later shared and published by PBI with various CSOs across the country and a collective document was submitted to the Ministry of Finance before the Union Budget 2018-19.

Support to Government of Maharashtra to undertake Children’s Budget

UNICEF and Government of Maharashtra have initiated a public expenditure review for child specific departments of WCD and Education. An outcome of this review was the formation of a reference group to advise the Department of PFM reforms. One of the PFM reforms was to incorporate budgeting for children. In this context the Department of Finance requested UNICEF Mumbai to provide technical support to suggest the framework for implementing child budget for the year 2018-19. Since the call for budget exercise will start sometime in September, the preliminary work needs to begin in July/August, 2017. HAQ was invited by UNICEF – Maharashtra to provide technical expertise to undertake children’s budgeting. On 20- 21 July, 2017, HAQ team (Enakshi Ganguly and Kumar Shailabh) along with UNICEF representatives met with officials of the Finance Department and based on these discussions HAQ shared a process that may be adopted for a budget for children statement in the state would have to follow the following process. HAQ also provided a template to the Finance Department of Maharashtra for including a special statement on children in the finance bill.



Costing Child Protection

UNICEF India is working on a medium-term strategy that seeks to strengthen initiatives to develop costing and financing models of child protection services, and to put in place budget execution tracking systems. In this context, UNICEF has contracted Cornerstone Economic Research for providing technical support to the UNICEF India office on costing of child protection services in the states of Bihar and Uttar Pradesh. HAQ is partnering with UNICEF, to provide local context and validation of the training package.

Three members of the HAQ team attended the Costing Methodology Training Workshop in Lucknow from 8- 10 February 2018. During the course of the training it was decided that the focus of the Costing exercise in the first phase would be limited to Costing ICPS. It was also agreed that there will be two streams of costing work each conducted by different local partners. One stream will cost child protection services and statutory services. This costing will cover the response and treatment set of activities, including the provision of services in institutions. Second stream will cost community strengthening and the interventions aimed at preventing the maltreatment and neglect of children. It was agreed that the costing will focus on two districts in each state.

Prevention of Child Marriage

Since 2012, HAQ has been working on the subject of prevention of child marriages, where the approach is to strengthen the existing systems to prevent the child marriages and also to engage with communities, especially men, to address this social evil. Currently, HAQ is executing this initiative in the State of West Bengal with JABALA (partner organisation) and with MJAS in Rajasthan. As a result of constant engagement, now, District Child Protection Units (DCPU) have been constituted in 2 districts under the project (Murshidabad and Birbhum). As part of the project interventions, there has been consistent participation from the project team for training and capacity building of the members of the VLCPCs in collaboration with DCPU.

During the state level consultation on reducing child marriage Murshidabad district collector offered to pilot a model of “child marriage free gram panchayats”. This has been a hugely positive move, but has required enhanced inputs from the team. In an effort to create child marriage free Gram Panchayat (GP), 2 panchayats have been identified in Murshidabad district as pilot initiatives. The two Panchayats are Rukundpur under Hariharpara block and Nutangram under Murshidabad-Jiaganj. As result one can see that child marriages have been successfully postponed in the villages under this panchayat and girls have been linked to existing schemes – Kanyashree and Rupashree along with regular follow-ups from the project team. Based on this convergence model and the joint action plan developed, interventions have been made in 42 cases of child marriage (30 in MJ block and 12 in Hariharpada).

The combination of mediums to create public awareness on child marriage attempted through the year. This included a Ted Talk by a woman who has survived child marriage; production of a 27-minute film- **I WILL PREVAIL**, which document stories of women, girls and boys who have fought child marriage in their lives; and publication of booklets titled as “**Child Marriage: No Never, Without My Consent Never Ever**”- based on stories and photographs from Rajasthan and West Bengal those of girls, communities and families, were released. An exhibition with selected photographs and stories around child marriage from the booklets was installed (which was on for 5 days 30 November to 4 November at the experimental Art Gallery -India Habitat Centre).



About 300 people came to the public event. Bhanwari Devi of Rajasthan who had faced violence while stopping a child marriage in 1992 and Murshida Khatun, a school principal from Murshidabad, West Bengal who had not just withstood child marriage in her own life, but continues to support her students to fight child marriage and continue their studies, were the chief guests. Dr. Sherman Young, the ProVC of Macquire University, Sydney, with whom HAQ had undertaken a global scoping study on child marriage (s part of Macquire's International PACE Programme), also attended the event. Ms. Urvashi Butalia, renowned Feminist and Writer and also President of HAQ, introduced the books and welcomed the guests. A concert by 'Space' - Tritha Sinha and Ritika Singh, who were accompanied by musicians from different countries, presented a concert.



Football (sports) for empowerment and solidarity between girls

In the project intervention area, football is a major activity to collectivize girls for empowerment and solidarity between girls. In the two districts, a total of 120 girls play football regularly in a very professional way. Although the girls are part of the same target area and member of the AGGs, the cost of their football training is being raised by the partner organization, Jabala from other sources. The girls' teams



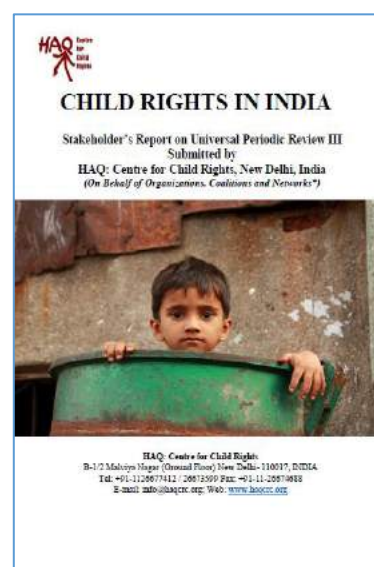
from Murshidabad and Birbhum have participated in various block & district level football matches organized administration of both districts. In February 2018, Birbhum Police organized inter-district football matches for boys and girls separately. Three AGG group members from Birbhum, who are part of the team won the Jangal Mahal Trophy awarded to the 3 best players. The Birbhum team won the final match from the Borai Development Society team. Other than Runner's trophy team received Rs. 1000/- from Mohammad Bazar Panchayat Samiti, Birbhum.

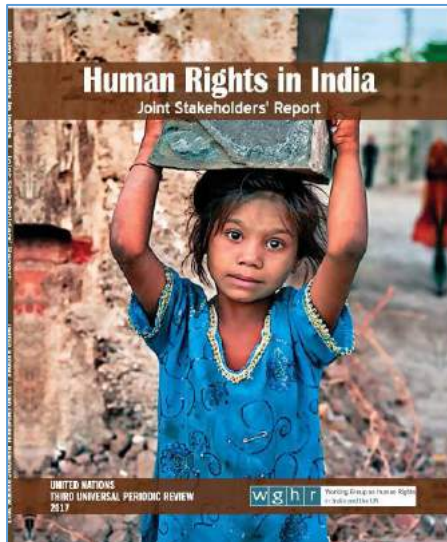
Universal Periodic Review-III (UPR III)

India's review of its developments on issues of Human Rights, as a part of Universal Periodic Review, was due in the year 2017. This was the third UPR Cycle for review of Human Rights issues and concerns in India. Like previous two UPR Cycles, HAQ submitted its report on the issues of child rights in India, which was endorsed by various organisations working with children.

HAQ is an active and founding member of the Working Group on Human Rights in India and at UN (WGHR). For the purpose of UPR-III, WGHR consulted various civil society organisations across the country to take stock of range of Human Rights issues and government's response towards addressing those

issues. HAQ contributed actively in compiling the issues and concerns of child rights and also suggested some recommendations to address those concerns. The report titled '*Human Rights in India: Joint Stakeholders Report*' was finally prepared and submitted to the UN for India's UPR-III.

Report endorsed by 1000+ organisations and individuals

During the third cycle of UPR, HAQ, through WGHR, has been extensively involved in advocating with various country missions based in India to help them understand the issues and concerns related to child rights. In this process, HAQ was selected and invited as one of the panel members to speak during the UPR Pre Sessions at Geneva during 4th to 8th April 2017. Kumar Shailabh represented HAQ at Geneva and presented a brief about the situation of child rights in India and further possible recommendations to make the situation better.

Child Rights at India's Third Universal Periodic Review at the UN Human Rights Council

On 4th May, India was reviewed by the member states on its performance of securing human rights in the country during the third cycle of India's Universal Periodic Review (UPR). The 27th monthly session of the UN Human Rights Council observed the participation of 141 member states. Based on the Government of India's Report to the Human Rights Council and Stakeholders' Report from India, the member states raised concerns on various thematic human rights issues and therefore suggested a total of 230 recommendations ranging from the issue of conviction against torture, death penalty, extrajudicial disappearances, India's flag, children's rights, women's rights, transgender's rights, caste based discrimination and citizenship in NREGA etc. etc.

While the UN was criticized on various human rights concerns, children's rights topped the list of recommendations with a total number of 73 recommendations made on various issues of children's rights. The previous two cycles of UPR first in 2008 and second in 2012, had never seen such significant number of recommendations on the issue of children. During the review, a total of 14 member states gave recommendations to India on six specific thematic issues of child rights, amongst the issues of children's rights, child labour, child marriage and sexual violence against children were the few issues on which the Government was criticized heavily.

While some of the neighbouring member states only appreciate India's work on human rights and abstain from giving any recommendations, few countries were seen to be vocal in voicing their concerns. Sweden gave the maximum number of recommendations to India on a range of children's issues followed by Chile, Liechtenstein, Mexico and Tunisia. Other member states too contributed positively with their recommendations during the review.

HAQ's engagement with the process of UPR continued even after India submitted its report. At the time of formal acceptance of recommendations by other countries, HAQ followed the recommendations and further segregated the recommendations specifically on child rights which India received from other countries and further shared with media and other groups.

CHILD PROTECTION

Legal Aid, Psychosocial and Rehabilitation Support

HAQ's work on child protection continues and has expanded in terms of providing psychosocial care and rehabilitative services to the victims of child sexual abuse. Currently, HAQ engages with two kinds of children under its child protection work - (a) child victims of sexual abuse, child trafficking, child labour and (b) children in conflict with law.

HAQ is currently working in the National Capital Territory of Delhi and continues to provide various need based support services touching critical areas such as medical care, shelter and protection, witness protection, educational needs etc. HAQ maintains a strong presence at

the Child Welfare Committees (CWCs) in Delhi and is thus marked cases to provide services of a “Support Person” under the POCSO Act on a regular basis. When it comes to children in conflict with law, HAQ’s role has been limited to providing counselling to such children based on orders from the Juvenile Justice Boards (JJBs). The reports are submitted to the concerned JJB.

The legal as well as psycho-social support services to child victims of sexual abuse are being provided with the support from the Human Dignity Foundation (HDF) for a project titled “Improving Access to Criminal Justice and Restorative Care for Child Survivors of Sexual Abuse in Delhi”.

Between 2015 and 2017, HAQ has provided support to 223 girl child victims of sexual abuse aged 13 years and above (64% of all 348 girls and 59% of all 379 children – boys and girls, supported during this period).

Note: The figures in the above tables reflect only the fresh cases taken up by HAQ in the different years. Every year there is also a backlog of cases being followed up from the previous years.

*In the case of CNCPs, we have provided children legal aid as well as psycho-social support. In some cases, we have also provided economic support. Although this leads to double counting, in effect each service provided is distinct and through staff specialising in different areas.

In this endeavour, HAQ has also partnered with the Department of Psychiatry at AIIMS, Médecins Sans Frontières/*Doctors Without Borders* (MSF) and Children First to provide mental health support to children and adolescents, Neptune Hospital in Malviya Nagar for medial support, the Delhi State Legal Services Authority (DSLSA) and District Legal Services Authorities (DLSAs) for victim compensation and other legal support, Delhi Judicial Academy for judicial training. HAQ also partners with iProbono for strategic litigation at High Court and Supreme Court level) and Teach for India – TFI (for training and sensitisation in schools).

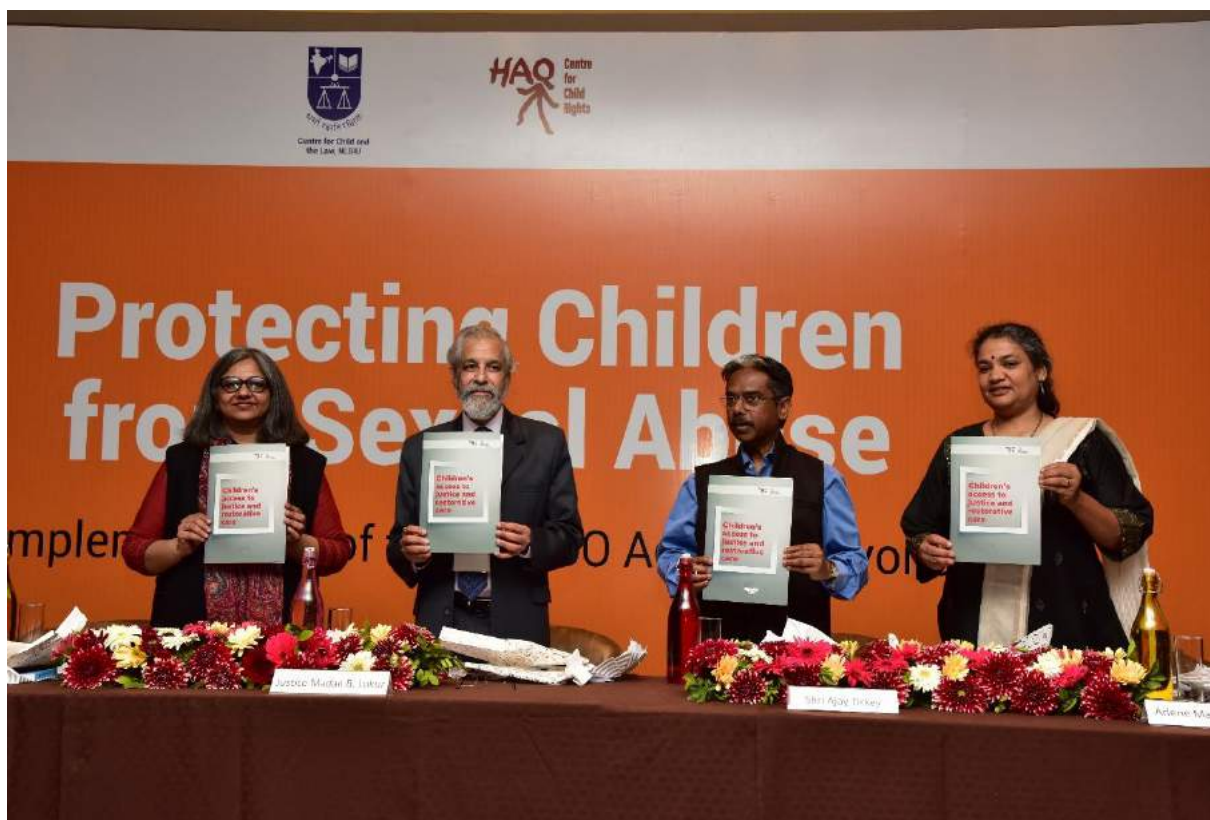


Research and Dissemination

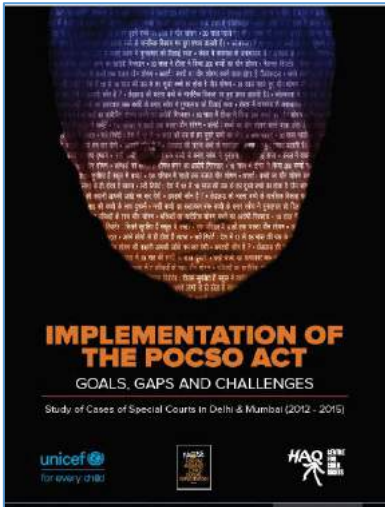
Research and knowledge creation has been one of the most crucial elements of HAQ's work throughout its interventions, especially its work with victims of child sexual abuse.

Fact Sheets on Children's Access to Justice and Restorative Care

Through the data generated from the case-work in 126 cases of child sexual abuse, HAQ attempted to study the implementation of POCSO cases and published a set ten fact sheets titled "**Children's Access to Justice and Restorative Care**". These factsheets discuss various elements attached with prosecution in POCSO cases as well as quality of care services for child victims of sexual abuse.



Study on Implementation of the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act, 2012



HAQ completed a study on the implementation of the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act, 2012 in Delhi and Mumbai in partnership with the Forum Against Child Sexual Abuse (FACSE). The study supported by UNICEF-India. The purpose of research was to collect evidence on implementation of the POCSO Act with regards to process, time taken in disposal of cases and orders passed by the special courts, perceptions of the abused, their families, their communities and service providers and the role of different actors / stakeholders.

The report titled ***“Implementation of the POCSO Act: Goals, Gaps and Challenges”*** documents cases of child sexual abuse from three Special Courts in Mumbai city and Five Special Courts in Delhi since the enforcement of the POCSO Act up to 31 July 2015.

A Two-Day National Consultation on Implementation of POCSO Act

HAQ, in partnership with CCL-NLSIU, Bangalore organised a two-day national level consultation on the issue of *“Protecting Children from Sexual Abuse: Implementation of the POCSO Act and Beyond”* at Hotel Pride Plaza in New Delhi. This consultation was organised on 24th and 25th February 2018 with the support of UNICEF, HDF and Tata Trusts. More than 60 representatives of various organisations, leading experts, lawyers, academics, senior officers from the Ministry of Women and Child Development representatives from the police and the prosecution, and representatives of the National and State Commissions for Protection of Child Rights gathered to discuss the issues and challenges while dealing with cases of child sexual abuse.

Hon’ble Mr. Justice Madan B. Lokur, Judge Supreme Court of India and Member of the Supreme Court’s Juvenile Justice Committee, delivered the key note address at the consultation. Pointing towards the need for more judges for Special Courts designated under the Act, Justice Lokur said, “Special Courts need to be special the whole time - it is very difficult for judges to switch from civil to criminal, let alone a switch as drastic as dealing with adult and child victims of sexual abuse.” Hon’ble Ms. Justice Gita Mittal, Acting Chief Justice of High Court of Delhi, also attended the deliberations on day one. During the consultation, three reports highlighting gaps and challenges in the implementation of the POCSO reports in different states were launched by Hon’ble Justice Sh. Madan B. Lokur and Sh. Ajay Tirkey, Additional Secretary, Ministry of Women and Child Development.

Two of the three reports were based on case records available from the courts’ websites or through the courts. These were studies conducted by CCL-NLSIU in five states and a research

jointly conducted by HAQ and FACSE in Delhi and Mumbai. The third report was in the form of fact sheets produced on the basis of HAQ's experience while providing legal aid and support services to child victims of sexual abuse. Speaking at the Consultation, Ms. Aastha Saxena Khatwani, Joint Secretary, Ministry of Women and Child Development, emphasized the importance of prevention of child sexual abuse, and called upon the participants to make recommendations for effective prevention. According to Mr. Javier Aguilar, UNICEF, "The burden of prevention cannot simply be on children, but has to shift to the adults who are responsible for children, and to all of us who create the institutions and structures that permit, and in fact, facilitate child sexual abuse." The participants also discussed contentious issues such as the age of consent, mandatory reporting, sex offenders registry, and death penalty for child rape. The consensus at the National Consultation was that the real solutions lay not in stricter punishment or death penalty, but in certainty of conviction, plugging delays in the system, and proper rehabilitation of the victim.

Campaign Against Child Sexual Abuse - "NO KIDDING - ACT NOW!" #EndChildSexualAbuse

HAQ, along with many grassroots and community based organisations in Delhi launched a campaign against child sexual abuse - **No kidding, Act Now!** 31 organisations working on different aspects of child rights supported this joint initiative, of which 19 actively participated in organising different activities across NCT of Delhi, as part of the campaign.

A **press conference** was held on 17 November 2017 at the Indian Women's Press Corps (IWPC), which was addressed by Ms. Enakshi Ganguly Thukral, from HAQ: Centre for Child Rights, Ms. Sumitra Mishra from Mobile Creche's, Mr. K.K. Tripathi from Butterflies, Mr. Ashok Kumar Jha from Dr A.V.Baliga Trust. Apart from these speakers, two mothers whose children survived the sexual abuse, shared their journey of struggle while coping with the justice delivery system. During the press conference, the campaign against child sexual abuse "No Kidding Act Now" was launched.



The campaign was at its peak between **19 November 2017 and 10 December 2017**, a period globally marked for recognition of human rights of various disadvantaged groups. During this period, the campaign was able to reach out to the community in different districts of the Capital through orientation sessions on child sexual abuse as well as the POCSO Act, screening of short films, legal awareness camps, rallies, and forum theatre. The campaign also accessed the middle class through the performance of ***Bitter Chocolate* by Lushin Dubey** held on **6th December 2017** and through an active **facebook** page. On the same day after the performance, a trailer of the series of four animated films was also released. These films are

meant to educate four key stakeholders on the subject of child sexual abuse and the law, these being children themselves, their parents and care givers, schools and the police. The films were put out in public domain w.e.f. 1 January 2018.

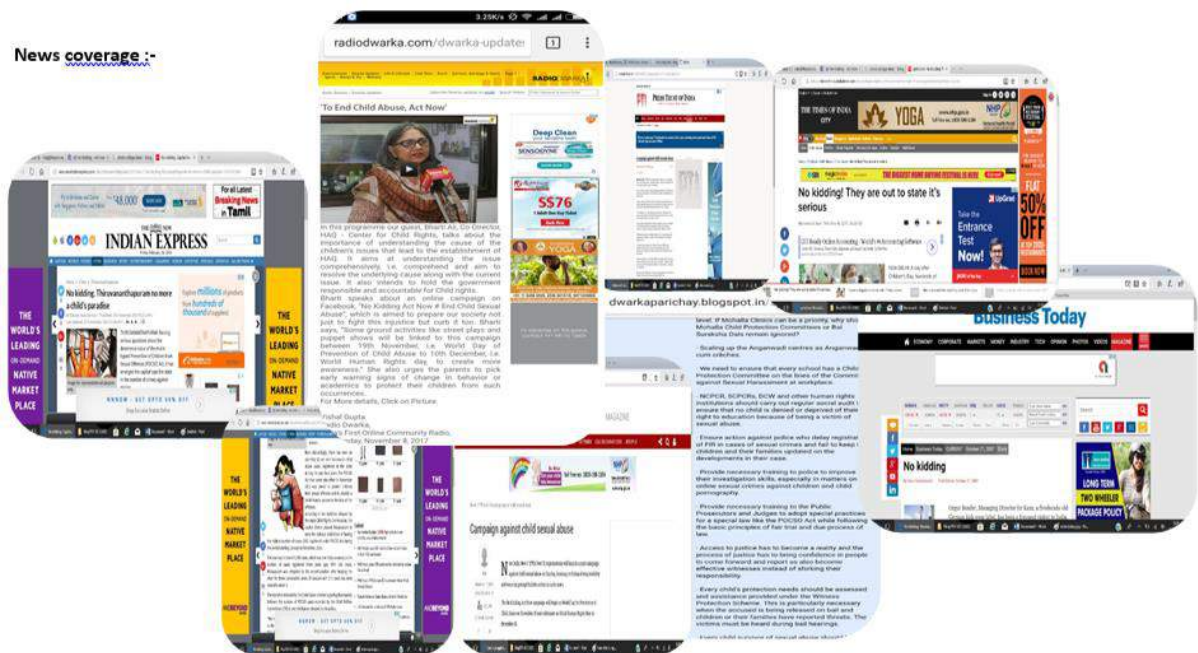


In this endeavor, the campaign came in contact with over **5,100** students, youth, teachers, parents, children residing in child care institutions, community workers from Anganwadis and NGOs, members of the judiciary, Child Welfare Committees among others. This massive outreach would

not have been possible without intense involvement of all the partners.

Campaign's digital **outreach through Facebook was 55,895** during the period of June 2017 to December 2017. All member organisations actively engaged in updating information and photographs of the activities on a **WhatsApp group having 66 members**. It helped in streamlining the campaign activities and spreading information about forthcoming events.

The Campaign culminated on 10 December with the support of MAMATA a partner organization. MAMATA has been associated with a number of schools and has been working on various aspects of child rights. These schools are majorly based in NOIDA. One such school was selected in consultation with MAMTA and the school authorities. A detailed plan of activities was chalked out and logistics arranged with pooling of resources from involved agencies. HAQ team along with other partners like Dr. A.V. Baliga Trust, Young Minds, Puppet Show Performers, MJAS through its President Ms. Indira Pancholi, and a large team of volunteers from Hamari Pahal and interns from HAQ contributed towards successfully carrying out the event.



Support Group of Parents of Survivors of Child Sexual Abuse (CSA)

In the year 2013, HAQ had initiated the idea of having a support group of parents of survivors of CSA, where they can meet each other, share their stories and experiences with the system and find emotional support from each other's struggles. In the last year, three meetings were held with the parents' group aimed at addressing the emotion of anger that parents may have towards their own selves, the abusers, the neighbourhood or the situation, or for that matter, their own children.

Family members, whose cases were old, had gained a lot from their association with HAQ and had the confidence to continue their fight for justice, despite all odds. In the new cases, the family members were still trying to get over the initial trauma and cope with their situation.



The meetings on 17th March 2017 and 13th April 2017 were held to discuss with the parents a felt need for filing two petitions in the Delhi High Court regarding victims' right to receive documents pertaining to their case and right to be heard when bail applications of the accused are put up before the trial courts. Many families talked about the threats they face when the accused is released on bail and the way the system, especially the police, treats them. They also complained of how they do not even get a copy of the FIR. Finally, with the help of iProbono, two petitions were filed through two parents for each petition.

Automation

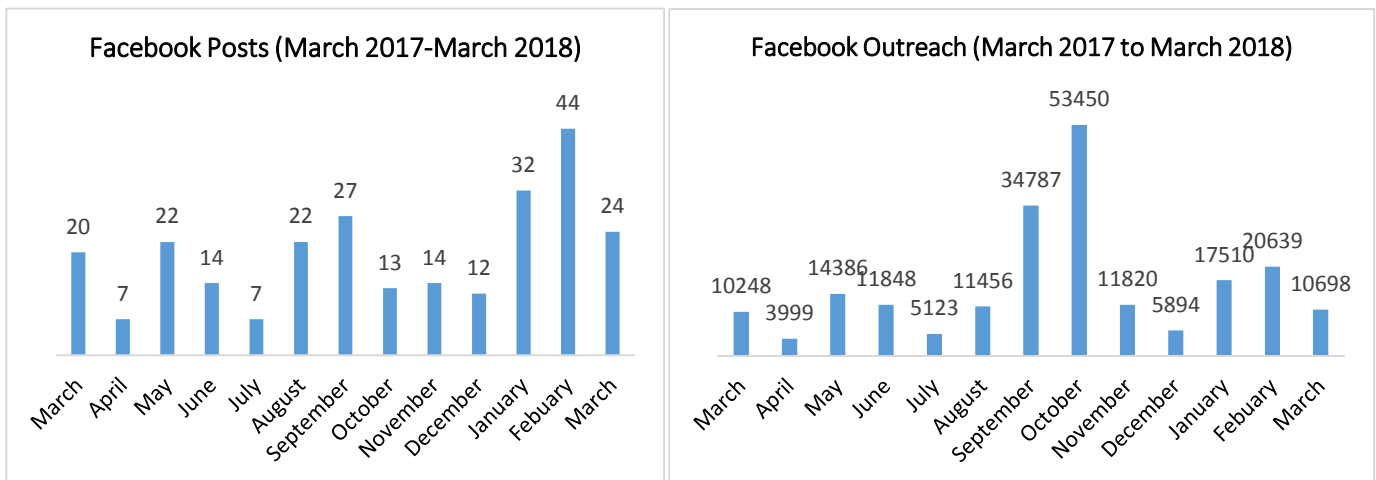
HAQ is currently being assisted by Mr. Deepak Loomba, an engineer by qualification, in preparing an automated system for organisational management and case-work management. The ground work for automation of case management and project MIS along with developing an organisational MIS has been completed. Network diagrams of critical components of HAQ's work, especially case management, have been prepared and tested on certain parameters. Coders have started working on the basis of these network diagrams. In addition, steps have been taken towards automation of stock and files, communication and human resource development. Certain SOPs for case-management have also been developed.

SOCIAL MEDIA

Apart from HAQ's project interventions, it also has a strong social media presence through facebook and twitter. On its Facebook page, HAQ keeps highlighting various issues of child rights for the purpose of awareness and also to initiate the critical debates on some of the burning issues of the child rights.

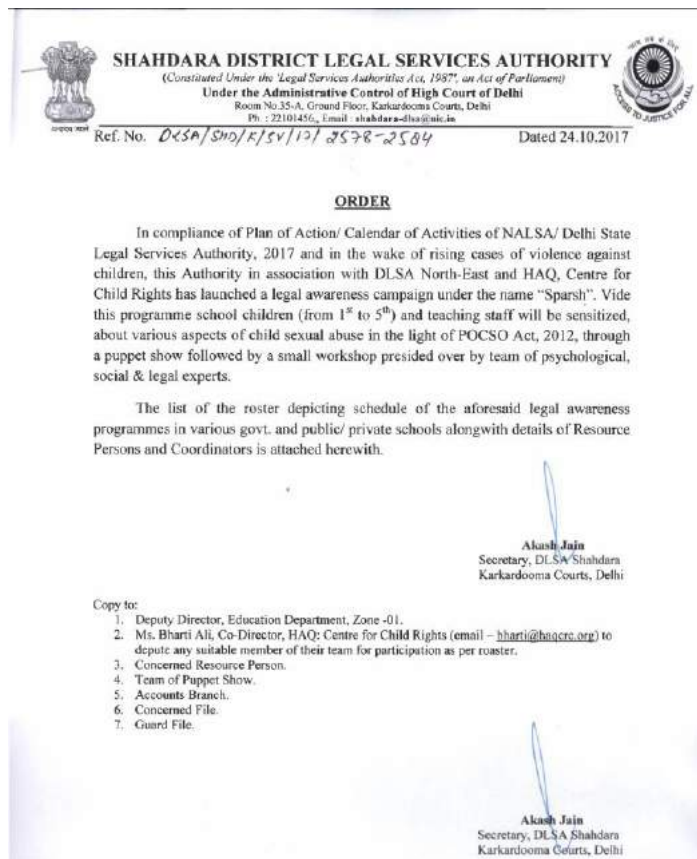
From the month of March 2017 to March 2018, a total of 258 posts have been uploaded on various issues which were reached by 211858 users. Similarly, HAQ also has dedicated facebook pages on child marriage and child sexual abuse. For example, HAQ's facebook page for prevention of child marriage has observed 55 posts which were reached by 11382 users.

HAQ is committed to strengthen its social media presence through various other social media tools to highlight the issues and concerns of child rights.



TRAININGS

Training and capacity building is one of HAQ's core areas of work. HAQ continues to engage with various stakeholders through trainings, sensitisation programmes and on a one-to-one basis to build their capacities for meeting the child protection goals. Police, Judiciary, Schools, NGOs, Counsellors etc. have been some of the key stakeholders in the past. The trainings are a two-way learning process where HAQ shares the requisite knowledge, information and skills while understanding the participants' views on the issues and challenges on the ground. Such programmes also help the implementers stay updated on the developments in the legal and policy framework and how to use these in their work. In the month of October 2017, the Delhi Legal Services Authority, Shahdara District, collaborated with HAQ and the Directorate of Education for a sensitization and awareness drive against child sexual abuse. In each of the training programmes a lawyer from DLSA, a puppet show team organised by DLSA and HAQ social workers were present to talk to students and teachers about the issue of child sexual abuse. In addition to these training



workshops, five capacity building programmes were organised between January to June 2017 on demand from schools and NGOs. (The list of trainings undertaken is available in Annexure II and III).

Besides conducting trainings, HAQ has also engaged in developing training and education materials. This year HAQ completed a training manual for ICPS functionaries in Jammu & Kashmir. A handbook has also been developed for Special Public Prosecutors in the Special Courts under the POCSO Act, which is now ready for printing and dissemination.

HAQ Members have been attending meetings called by the Special Police Unit for Women and Children (SPUWC) to discuss how to impart training for Child Welfare Police Officers (CWPOs) and develop an appropriate module.

IMPACT LITIGATION

While supporting children who come in contact with the law and representing them in courts or providing other support services one comes across several challenges requiring a judicial remedy. Impact litigation has been an important tool in overcoming these challenges. Besides 7 writ petitions / PILs pending before the Supreme Court of India and Delhi High Court carried over from the previous years, this year HAQ supported two PILs delving into issues pertaining to child friendly judicial processes enlisted in the POCSO Act. Realising that expediting trials is not something that can be ensured through court intervention, HAQ decided to focus specifically on issues that hamper access to justice. Details of the two PILs are as follows:

1. Reena Jha and Anr Vs. Union of India and Ors. [W.P. (C) 5011/2017, Delhi High Court]

S-40 of the POCSO Act provides that the family or the guardian of the child shall be entitled to the assistance of a legal counsel of their choice for the offence under this Act. Similarly, under Rule 4(f) of the POCSO Rules, 2012, the child (or his parent or guardian or other person in whom the child has trust and confidence) is to be informed about the right of the child to legal advice and counsel and the right to be represented by a lawyer in terms of Section 40 of the POCSO Act.

Further Rule 4(11) and (12) of the POCSO Rules, 2012 specifically direct that the Special Juvenile Police Unit (SJPU) or the local police must keep the child or the parent or the guardian as the case may be, informed about the developments including and not limited to:

- The Arrest of the Accused.
- Applications filed in Court
- Status of investigation
- The filing of charges

- Schedule of Court proceedings
- The Bail, detention status and release of an offender or a suspected offender.

Neither the Special Courts nor the Special Juvenile Police Units are following these mandatory provisions. Two parents from the support groups of parents of child survivors of sexual abuse whose cases are being dealt with by HAQ were ready to go to the High Court with their grievance in this regard. The accused persons in their child's case were granted regular bail by the Special Courts, without any information / intimation to the Petitioners (who also happened to be the First Informants) or any other family member regarding the listing of bail applications. Consequently they were unrepresented during the bail hearing and the accused were released in violation of the mandate of the POCSO Act. Accordingly, the parents approached the Hon'ble Delhi High Court through a PIL filed with the help of iProbono.

This PIL has been admitted by the Hon'ble High court and now the same is pending disposal.

- 2. Arti Gupta and Ors Vs. Union of India and Anr. [W.P. (C) 8295/2017, Delhi High Court]**
S-25(2) of POCSO Act casts a mandatory duty upon the Special Courts dealing with POCSO Act cases to supply the copy of charge sheet along with all documents as specified under section 207 of Cr.P.C to the child and her/his parents or her/his representative free of cost. It is a special provision enacted in order to safeguard the interest of the child during the trial of offences under the POCSO Act. But this mandatory provision is not being complied with by the Special Courts of Delhi.

Five parents from the support groups of parents of child survivors of sexual abuse supported by HAQ approached the Hon'ble Delhi High Court through a PIL for compliance of this mandatory provision as they were deprived of their right to get a copy of the charge sheet and other documents in their child's case. This PIL has been admitted by the Hon'ble High court and is pending disposal.

Highlights from a few other important cases:

In **Court on Its Own Motion vs. GNCTD & Ors. [W.P. (C) 11187/2017, Delhi High Court]**, Bharti Ali and Anant Asthana have been appointed as Amici Curiae to assist the court in looking into matters pertaining to implementation of the Juvenile Justice Act. The court has been concentrating on infrastructural issues in government run child care institutions for children in need of care and protection and children in conflict with the law. As a result of this case, grants that were waiting a sanction from the Delhi Department of Women and Child Development have been cleared and repair and maintenance work by PWC has been initiated.

In **Neetu Through Rewati Ram Versus State [W.P. (Crl) 869 / 1998, Delhi High Court]** concerning missing children, the court is deliberating on a face recognition app developed by Delhi Police.

As a result of **W.P. (C) 8348 / 2017, Anant Kumar Asthana Versus Union of India**, the Delhi government has been forced to prepare its own state rules under the JJ Act. Delhi had adopted the Central rules as it is, not realising there are several inconsistencies in the Central Model Rules.
